**NEH Summer Seminar for College and University Teachers**  
**The Reformation of the Book: 1450-1700**

John N. King and James K. Bracken of The Ohio State University will direct an NEH Summer Seminar for College and University teachers on the gradual transformation of the production, dissemination, and reading of Western European books during the 250 years following advent of printing with movable type. They plan to pose the question of whether the advent of printing was a necessary precondition for the Protestant Reformation. They also plan to explore the related problem of whether the impact of printing was revolutionary or evolutionary. Employing key methods of the still-emerging interdisciplinary field of the History of the Book, this seminar's investigation of cultural continuity and change will entail consideration of how the physical nature of books affected ways in which readers understood and assimilated their intellectual contents.

This seminar will meet from 18 June until 20 July 2007, in Antwerp and Oxford. Participants will receive a stipend of \$3,600. Citizens of USA including independent scholars who have received the terminal degree in their field (usually the Ph.D.), American citizens teaching at colleges and universities outside of the USA, and non-US citizens who have taught and lived in the USA for at least three years prior to the application deadline of 1 March 2007 are eligible to apply.
